#### **Resolution 13-17F**

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties establish an advisory committee with a mandate to provide a rural perspective in support of the efforts of the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission's commitment in moving forward with changes in the charitable gaming funding to treat all organizations equally across the province.



#### **Committee Mandate**

The committee's role will focus on recommendations and improvements to the charitable gaming model to ensure the model is equitable to rural based organizations that are reliant, at least in part, on the revenues of charitable gaming.

- Geographic size and number of charities in regions are not consistent
- Revenue within a region pooled over three months and shared equally among charities within that region.

# **Defining Equal**

- Equality is very challenging in such a complex system
  - Equal access?
  - Equal revenue?
  - Unintended consequences of equality?
  - Equality versus simplicity.
- Maybe equality cannot happen all at once...



## **Principles and Recommendations**

- Five principles, four recommendations
- Principles: high level characteristics of an equal system
- Recommendations: specific ways to make the system more equal





# **Principles**

- Stability
- Equitable value
- Equitable access
- Flexibility
- Volunteer-driven




Pool a portion of the revenues generated in each region and distribute equally to all regions.



- Committee recommended 20% pooling
- 20% closes gap between haves and have-nots
- Edmonton and Calgary annualized proceeds decrease by approximately 15%
- All other regions increase by at least 21%
- Gap remains, but is reduced





Address inequities associated with the model



- Travel costs:
  - Much higher for many organizations in low revenue regions some organizations may use 13% or more of their proceeds for travel costs.
  - Create a travel cost pool: all regions contribute equally and organizations receive funding support from pool based on distance travelled.



More flexibility in date selection

• Incentivize unpopular dates (holidays, etc.)

Allow assignment in neighboring regions with shorter waiting lists



Stakeholders, including the AGLC, RMA and AUMA, should take a collaborative approach to improving the current gaming model



Collaborate for a fairer model

 Organizations should not be rewarded or penalized based on location

 Effective change must be gradual and collaborative, not based on conflict



Regularly review the model and proceed towards equality





Review of model has been inconsistent

 Province must recognize equality as goal and work towards it in long-term

Regular formal review and changes every five years
