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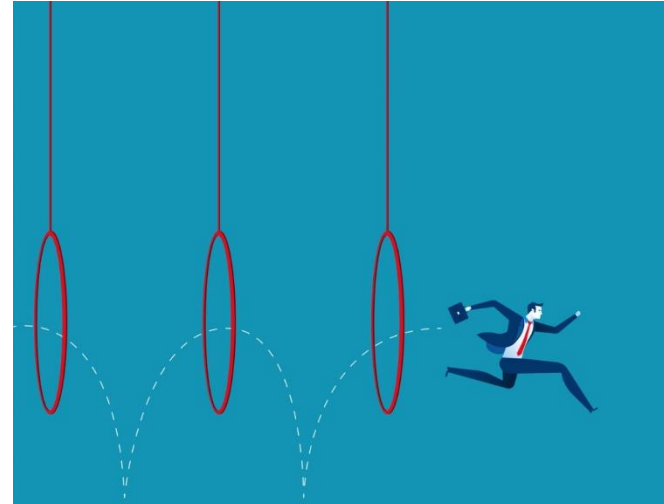

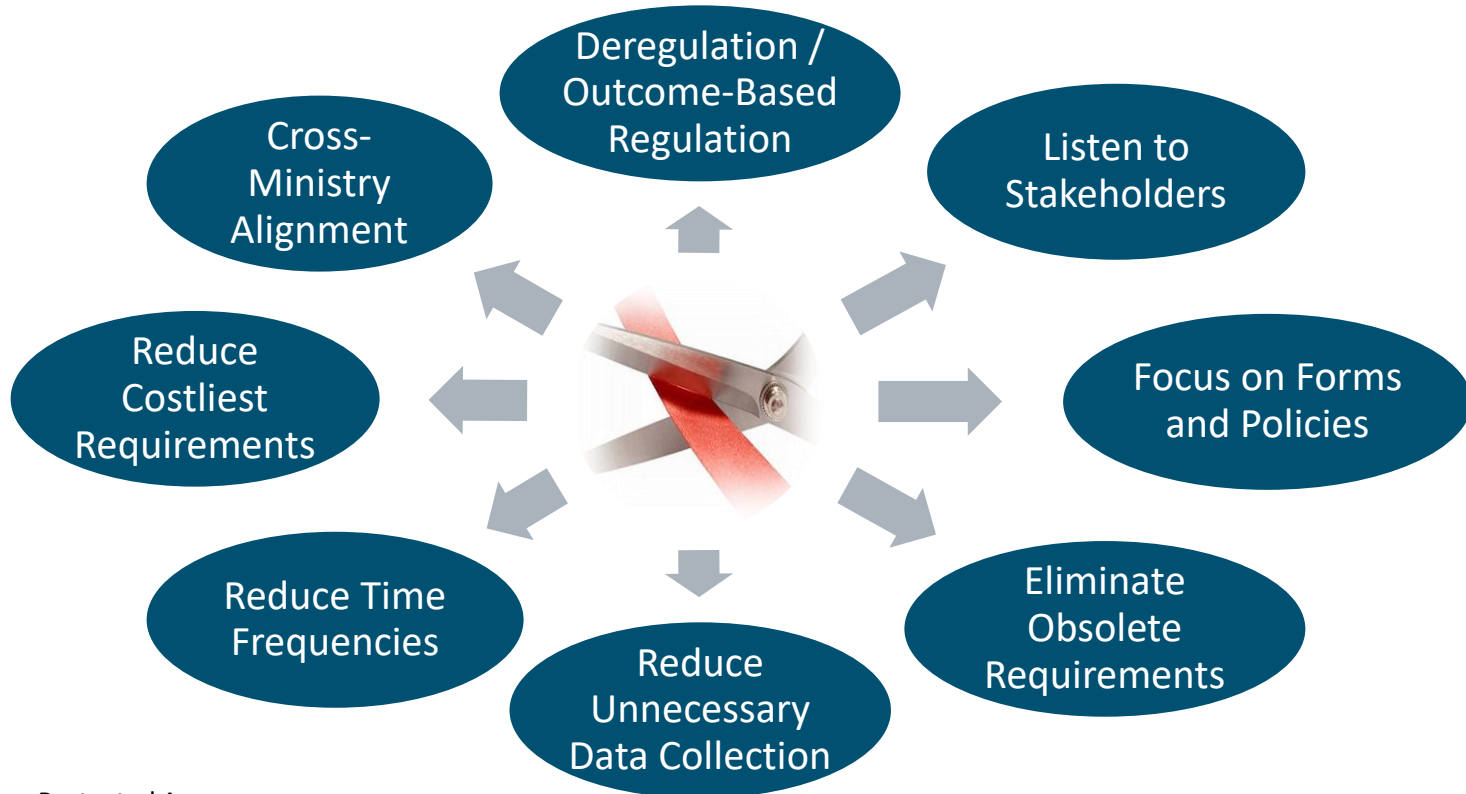

Alberta Agriculture and Forestry Red Tape Reduction Efforts



RTR Opportunity Identification



To identify red tape reduction opportunities to improve efficiency and reduce regulatory burden in Alberta

- AF has completed a baseline count of regulatory, policy and form requirements and continues to work to reduce that count driving to 33% reduction by 2023.
- AF is using its existing relationships with key stakeholders to gather RTR ideas.
- AF has gathered RTR opportunities through online public submissions, industry submissions, industry RTR panels and from within the ministry.
- AF continues to lead a culture change within the department to drive the elimination of red tape.

What We Have Heard



- Streamline the Canadian Agricultural Partnership application process for producers.
- Support the sustainability of Livestock & Poultry Confined Feeding Operations (CFOs), which need to address municipal constraints due to public pressure.
- Restore efficiency and transparency to the process to access funding for industry-led research and market development for Alberta's agriculture sectors.

What We Have Heard



- Request that AF consolidate forestry related approvals to streamline approvals for forest related operations.
- Consider developing a new Forest Management Agreement (FMA) Renewal Policy and Process that will ensure the renewal process is clearly understood by FMA holders and to ensure that only pertinent information is collected.

What We Have Done



Completed 25 Red Tape Reduction Initiatives and reduced Regulatory Requirement Counts by 8.53%

Response Time Reduction for *Weed Act* Appeals

- Created a streamlined process that reduced appeal time by 270 days.

Deregulate Crop Disease - *Fusarium graminearum*

- Reduced the regulatory burden for the majority of municipalities while giving others autonomy to regulate the crop disease as they see fit.

Amendments to the *Marketing of Agricultural Products Act*

- Updated authorities to empower agriculture marketing boards and commissions with greater autonomy in their decision-making.

What We Have Done



Final Mile Rural Community Program Reporting Reduction

- Reduced the reporting requirements of grant agreements under the Final Mile Rural Community Program.

Forest Management Agreements

- Changed the authority to allow the Minister to enter into a Forest Management Agreement (FMA) without prior approval of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

Completed farmer-led Agriculture Research Review

- Streamlined the approval and review process for Agriculture research.

Forest products Haul Annual Operating Plan

- Discontinued the Haul Annual Operating Plan requirement.

Looking Forward



Agriculture Operation Practices Act (AOPA) Review

- Review and amend AOPA to streamline approval processes and encourage long term sustainability of industry within rural municipalities.

Modernization of the Agricultural Pests Act regulations

- Review of regulations to reduce regulatory requirements and clean up administrative pieces.

Review of Alberta Approved Farmers' Market Program Guidelines

- Review of policies around Farmer's Market operations to reduce red tape and to remove barriers to entry.

Looking Forward



Changes to *Forests Act* legislative framework

- Review of *Forests Act* to reduce regulatory requirements, increase administrative efficiencies and promote long-term forest sector competitiveness.

Streamlining / Amalgamating Forestry Operating Ground Rules

- Review operating ground rules for forestry operations to streamline and amalgamate policies where possible.

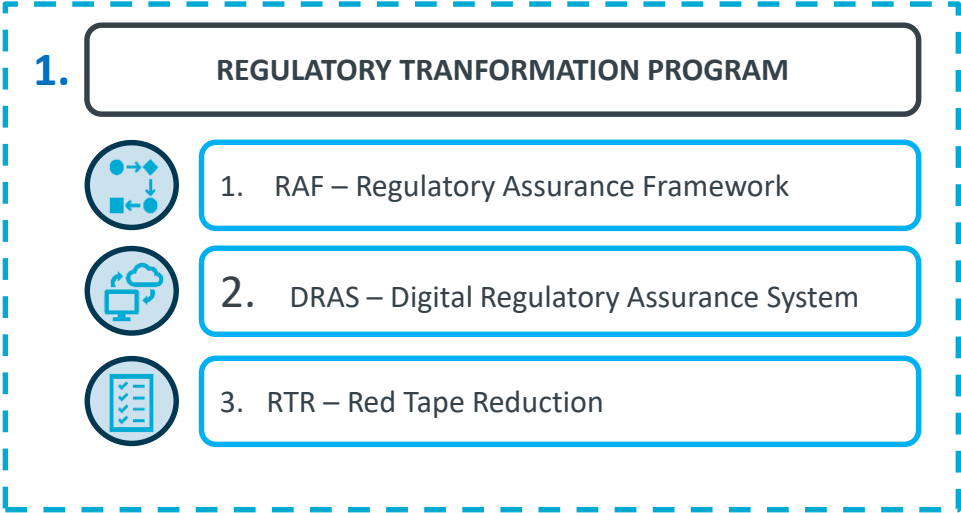
Canadian Agricultural Partnership (CAP) Program Modernization Project

- Through the realignment of CAP to the GOA/AF priorities, the suite of CAP programs will be adjusted to stream-line and reduce the number of programs.

Consistency in Crown Land Management

What We Have Heard



- Remove inconsistencies from the Master Schedule of Standards and Conditions (MSSC) where they contradict the Code of Practice for watercourse crossings
- Update the watercourse crossings directives to include other risk based approaches to managing water course crossings
- Delete the requirement for monthly reports on air, water, industrial wastewater, potable water, sanitary wastewater, solid waste
- Allow for storm water to be diverted to sustain wetlands in an urban environment



What We Have Heard

- Review and remove unnecessary overlap (e.g. within municipal waste water and storm drainage design standards)
- Evaluate and improve approval processes (e.g. *Water Act* fence line zone approval process)
- Review and update existing regulations related to recycling of used oil, paint, electronics and tires
- Develop a made in Alberta Extended Producer Responsibility Paper and Packaging Program

What We Have Done



Completed 54 Red Tape Reduction Initiatives

Code of Practice for Powerlines Works Impacting Wetlands

- Applied a more appropriate level of oversight for low-risk construction activities

Sand and Gravel, EPEA and Water Act Approvals Backlog Projects

- Significantly reduced application backlogs AEP made 1,717 decisions (77% reduction) between May and September, 2020

Streamline Regulatory Process for Road Widening

- Reduced the number of environmental approval/authorizations required for municipal road maintenance activities, and made adjustments to the process to accept desktop assessments

What We Have Done



Update the fee setting process for provincial recycling program

- Streamlined fee changes through an administrative process to ensure provincial recycling programs are financially sustainable and that Albertans continue to have access to these recycling opportunities

Technology Innovation and Emissions Reduction

- Creating a more reasonable emissions regulation

Wildlife Amendments and Digitization of Licenses

- Making it easier for Albertans to enjoy the great outdoors when they are fishing and hunting



Looking Forward

Non-municipal drinking water systems

- Using an outcomes based approach to regulate non-municipal drinking water systems.

Restoration and retention of natural wetlands

- Provide streamlined approval process for low impact activities and construction projects

Stormwater use

- Reduce barriers to using stormwater as an alternative water source

Address watercourse crossings

- Providing greater flexibility during emergencies and electronic reporting to fulfill monitoring requirements

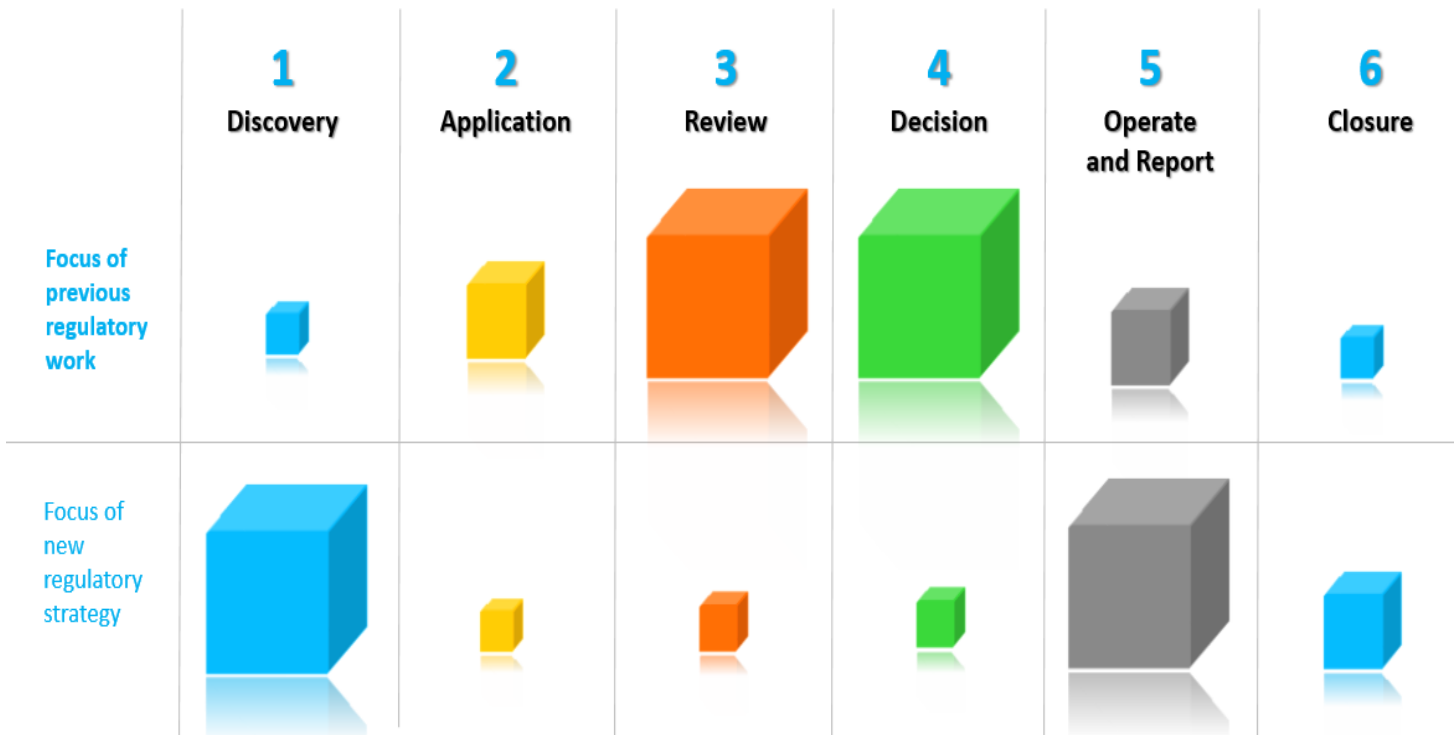
Regulatory Transformation

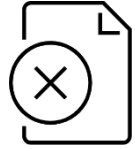
Alberta Municipal Affairs Red Tape Reduction Efforts

What we Have Heard



- The *Municipal Government Act* is Alberta's second-largest piece of legislation.
 - In addition to red tape reduction commitment, Premier Kenney directed department to review Act “line by line”.
- Approach
 - Engagement with key partners – like RMA, AUMA and industry.
 - Part by part review
 - Focus on both reducing red tape but also streamlining MGA

What We Have Done



- First set of amendments
 - Expanded some City Charter provisions to all municipalities and other flexibilities
 - E.g. ability to use electronic notices, ability to correct tax rate bylaw without need for Ministerial Order
- Second set – Part 17.2 (Intermunicipal Collaboration Frameworks)
 - Streamlined and simplified while retaining intent
 - Aligned with feedback from stakeholders, including RMA

What We Have Done



- Third set of amendments – Part 15.1 (Regional Service Commissions)
 - Retained intent of section allowing municipalities to use RSCs to deliver services, but significantly streamlined the process around creation, dissolution, and operations of RSC
 - Reduced 608 regulatory requirements in both MGA and regulations

Looking Forward



- This fall: Part 17 and 17.1 (Planning and Development)
 - Streamline and eliminate unnecessary provisions and redundancies
- Next spring: Governance parts
- Next fall: Taxation and assessment parts

Other MA changes



- Reduced red tape for wood building construction
 - Early adoption of 2020 building code allows for 12 storey wood buildings.
- Oil and Gas equipment safety verification
 - Allows companies to use professional engineers to verify safety.
- Streamlined owner-builder authorizations
 - 35 per cent faster approval for Albertans building their own homes.
- Streamlined grants process
 - Simplified forms for MSI, PERC and DIRC programs
- Upgraded Municipal Disaster Recovery Program form
 - More up-front information means less follow-up
